


Traditional Agents

People or groups that affect our self concept, attitudes, behaviors or other orientations towards life.

The Family



Initial motivations, values, beliefs

Basic sense of self, ideas about who you are and what you deserve in life.

Strong vs. Weak, Smart vs. Dumb, Good-Looking vs Ugly, etc.

Poor/Working Class – child as wildflower: will develop naturally

– job expectations: told what to do, obedience

Middle/Upper Class – child as tender houseplant: require guidance

- job expectations: initiative, creativity, innovation

Low income neighborhoods:

trouble with law, pregnant, drop out of school, mental health issues

Affluent neighborhoods:

stronger ties to neighbors, more community support, fewer families in transition

Day Care




More time in daycare = weaker bonds with parents = less affectionate

Less cooperative with others and more likely to fight

Regardless of quality of daycare, family social class, gender (1999, 2001, 2006, 2010)

The School


Hidden curriculum- values, not taught explicitly, are part of a school's "cultural message"

Stories and examples used by teachers may also contain lessons on patriotism, honesty, justice, etc.

Corridor curriculum- what students teach one another outside the classroom

Racism, discrimination, sexism, what is cool

Elementary- separate by sex and create gender worlds

Boys- popularity based on athletics ability, coolness, and toughness

Girls- popularity based on family background, physical appearance, ability to attract boys




The Workplace

Learn both a set of skills but a new way to look at the world.

Anticipatory socialization- learning to play a role before entering it – preparing for a career

Resocialization



Learning new norms, values, attitudes, and behaviors to match their new situation contrary to previous experiences

Total Institution



A place that is almost totally controlled by those who run it, in which people are cut off from the rest of society and the society is mostly cut off from them.





Degradation Ceremony


A ritual whose goal is to remake someone's self by stripping away that individual's self-identity and stamping a new identity in its place


