
- 24% "almost constantly"

- 71% of teens report using multiple social networking platforms
- Overall, most teens still claim to use Facebook most often
- Older teens (15-17): Facebook
- Younger teens (13-14): Instagram

Teens owning smartphone:

- 85% of African-Americans
- 71% of Hispanics and Whites

Online "almost constantly":

- 34% African-American
- 32% Hispanic
- 19% White

Gender Breakdown




- Boys are more likely than girls to visit Facebook most often (45% vs. 36%)
- Girls are more likely than boys to visit Instagram most often (23% vs. 17%)


Percent of girls and boys who use ...

Percent of girls and boys who ...



Twitter also shows that more wealthy kids tend to use it more often than others





Cookies & Beacons



Cookies- small pieces of data sent from a website and stored in a user's computer. Every time the user loads the website, the browser sends the cookie back to notify the website of the user's previous activity

Beacons- any of a number of techniques used to track who is reading a web page or email, when, and from which computer. Web bugs are typically used by third parties to monitor the activity of customers at a site.














Add-on and App that blocks trackers and beacons



Location Tracking

Location Services program on smartphones may be helpful but also an invasion of your privacy. Make sure you check your phone's settings so you know what you are sharing with others.


- GPS is used for map and weather apps
- Information is also gathered about specific places you go and how long you spend in each place
- If you aren't careful, this information may be shared with your phone company, cellular provider and other companies.


iPhone

Open your iPhone's "Settings" menu, select "Privacy", then "Location Services", then scroll all the way down to "System Services".



In System Services scroll all the way down to the bottom, press "Frequent Locations" and look at the "History" section. Click on one of the area names to see where you've been.
